

What is a Scam?




Dishonest or fraudelent attempt to take something of value from you (money, personal information or other valuables)

What is Identity Theft?

When someone takes your personal information without your permission.

It's a type of fraud where the main objective is to steal your personal information instead of money or other valuables.





What You Can Do:

- 1. Learn the warning signs for different types of scams
- 2. Protect your personal information
- 3. Never rush into anything





Signs That Someone is Trying to Scam You:

- Unexpected contact
- Tries to gain trust in some way
- Emotional manipulation





Signs That Someone is Trying to Scam You: Emotional manipulation

Fear:

- Use of Scare Tactics
 - -act now or you will be deported
 - -your computer has been hacked
 - -threatening arrest if you don't act now

Urgency:

- Time Pressure Tactics
- Asks for an immediate action. (e.g., transfer money quickly)
- · Time-limited offers

Excitement:

- Attractive promises such as free gift cards, job offers, or a deal that seems too good to be true.
- Fake prizes, fake contests, giveaways.
- Fraudsters claim you are entitled to receive something, only to ask for an "advance payment."



Signs That Someone is Trying to Scam You:

- Asks to pay in an unusual way (Wire transfer request, gift card, mobile app, etc.).
- Asks for personal information (passwords, PINs, etc.)
- You suspect you're not dealing with a real organization






Common Scams Targeting Immigrants



Notary Public "Notario Publico" Scams



What it looks like:

Individuals or services represent themselves as qualified to offer legal advice or services concerning immigration or other matters of the law.



Notary Public "Notario Publico"

Tips:

- "Notario Publicos" in the United States are <u>not lawyers</u> and cannot help you with immigration.
- They are authorized only to certify your identity and signatures (witness the signature of forms).

Remember:

- Don't go to a "notario" for immigration or legal help
- Don't sign blank immigration forms
- Don't let a "notario" or anyone else keep your original documents





Immigration Service Provider Fraud



What it looks like:

Individuals who provide false information

- Represent themselves as qualified to offer legal advice or services they do not intend to provide or are not licensed to provide
- Produce and sell fake documents
- Make false promises:

"We can help you get your green card faster"

Immigration Service Provider Fraud HELPFUL TIPS!

There are legitimate organizations that can help you, but there also are scammers looking to trick you into giving them money and sensitive information.

Tips:

- New York State law prohibits immigration service providers from giving legal advice, threaten to report you, promise special favors, or charge a fee for a referral to someone qualified to help or represent you. In many cases, These services are often readily available at no charge.
- Ask for a written agreement that describes the services being provided





Immigration Service Provider Fraud

What immigration service providers can and cannot provide:



- ✓ Immigration service providers may assist with clerical services such as filling out immigration forms or translating documents.
- ✓ Providers must post clear, multi-lingual, signage about the limited scope of their services.
- ✓ Providers must provide written contracts in the language that you understand.



- ☑ Providers cannot demand a fee for providing immigration forms or a referral to a qualified legal service provider.
- ☑ Providers cannot state or hint that they can influence or get special favors or specific outcomes from any government entity.

Diversity Lottery "Visa Lottery" Scams

What it looks like:

 Scammers try to trick people by charging money to apply to the program, promising special access, or promising to increase someone's chances of winning the lottery

Tips:

- The U.S. Department of State manages the Diversity Visa Immigrant Program
- It's FREE to enter
- Winners are picked at random to win the chance to apply to become lawful permanent residents – no one can influence the results
- You can **only** enter at dvlottery.state.gov
- Can only enter once a year
- Only if you're from an eligible country and meet the educational or work requirements



Fake Government Websites

What it looks like:

 Poor design quality, poor grammar, insufficient contact Information

Tips to identify a fake:

- Check the url
- For government websites, avoid selecting sponsored links
- Check the contact page
- Check for the website's privacy policy
- Exercise Caution When Doing Any Transaction Online:
 Make sure that you transact with reputable websites that use encryption.

NOTE:

https: The "s" in https stands for secure

All government websites end with **.gov**





Fake Job Opportunities

What it looks like:

 Scammers try to trick people by charging money to apply for jobs, or to get access to their personal information

• Tips:



Some red flags to look for:

- You didn't contact them;
 they contacted you
- You must provide very sensitive personal information before applying or interviewing






Fake Job and Training Opportunities

If You're Considering a Training Program, Career or Vocational School, Avoid Schools That:

- Guarantee employment
- Promise a degree in a very short time and provide limited information
- Charge a flat rate for a degree or certificate
- Use high pressure sales tactics





Fake Job and Training Opportunities

3 Ways to Identify a Legitimate Career or Vocational School:

- Confirm if the School is Licensed in New York State
 - Medical Assistance
 - Nursing as a Certified Nurse's Aide
- Barber
- Cosmetology
- Esthetics & Nail Technology
- Personal Trainer
- Computer Applications/Programming
- Auto Mechanic
- Audio/Visual and
- · Film Careers, Construction Trades


Required by law to be licensed and must meet rigorous State standards

2 Licensed vs. Unlicensed Program

Students attending licensed schools receive many benefits and protections which cannot be provided to students who attend non-licensed schools.

- Training recognized by employers
- Tuition protection and reimbursement
- And more!

What is Phishing?

- The practice of sending fraudulent communications that appear to come from a reputable source
- Usually performed through calls, emails, social media (What's App, Facebook, etc.), or texts
- Includes bad links that can download malware





Phishing Scams: Government Impersonator

What it looks like:

"you've violated immigration law"

"your identity information is wrong"... or "out of date"

"you owe fees or need to pay an immigration bond"





Phishing Scams: Government Impersonator

Tips:

- Government agencies (ICE and USCIS) will never contact you out of the blue and demand money.
- Be wary of someone who wants you to pay a fee or share personal details without going through proper channels.
- When in doubt, contact the government agency directly

Remember:

Government agencies do not:

- ⊠ Request personal or financial information through email, or social media (What's App, Facebook, etc.)
- □ Demand money to dismiss an investigation.
- ⊠ Receive payment via pre-paid gift cards or money transfer apps.

General Tips To Avoid Phishing Scams

- Anything can be imitated
- Stay vigilant, well informed and prepared.
- If you didn't initiate the communication, don't share your personal information
- Inspect the sender's information to confirm that it comes from a legitimate source
- Don't pay anyone who asks you to pay by gift card, money transfer or cryptocurrency for immigration help
- Don't click on suspicious links
